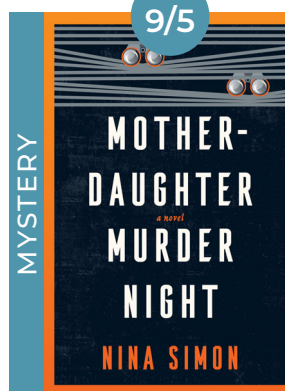

When Margaret and Hal buy their dream house for a steal, they discover the stuff of nightmares. But the worse the hauntings become; the more Margaret is determined to stay.

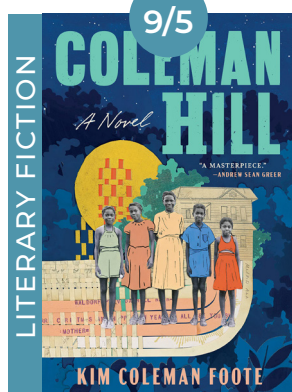

A Silicon Valley middle manager unwittingly uncovers information about a secret US military A.I. project called “black magic” and finds himself the target of federal authorities.



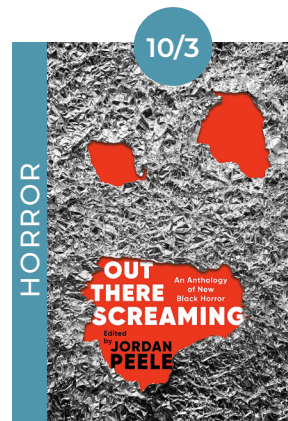
Woke Up Like This

Two high school seniors are decorating their prom when a minor mishap catapults them from teenage nemeses to married adults in this funny tale about growing up too fast.



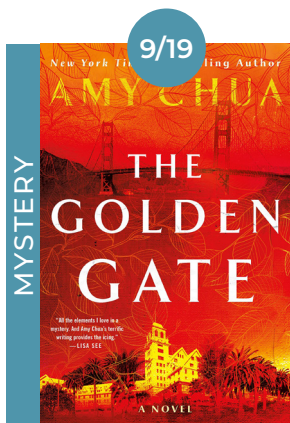
North Woods

A groundbreaking anthology of all-new Black horror stories, exploring not only the terrors of the supernatural but the chilling reality of injustice that haunts our nation.



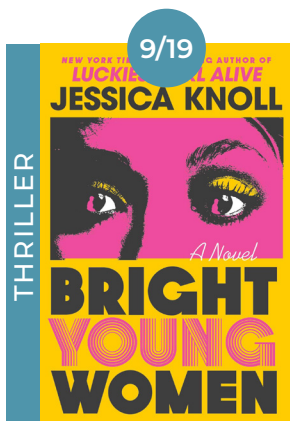
The Golden Gate

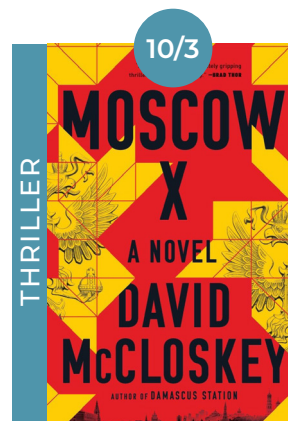
After The Forest

Two women from opposite sides of the country are brought together by violent acts of the same man and become allies as they pursue the justice that would otherwise elude them.



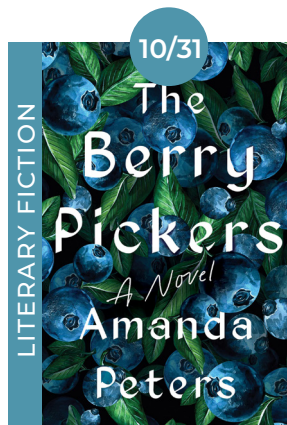
Moscow X

A daring CIA plot threatens chaos in the Kremlin. Its execution is foiled by a Russian woman with secret loyalties.



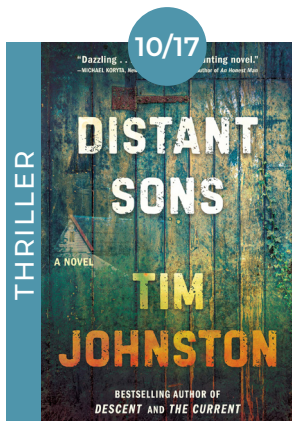
Artificial

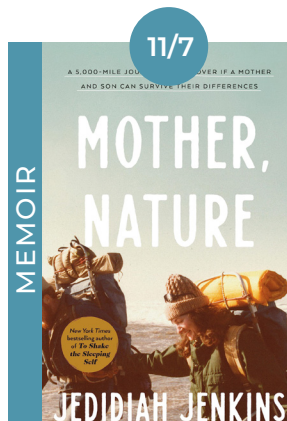
The Berry Pickers

July 1962. When the young daughter of a Mi'kmaq family mysteriously vanishes during a summer in Maine, the tragic mystery remains unsolved for decades.



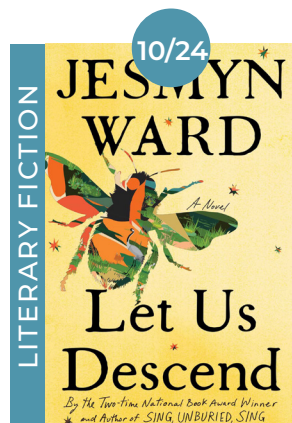
Distant Sons

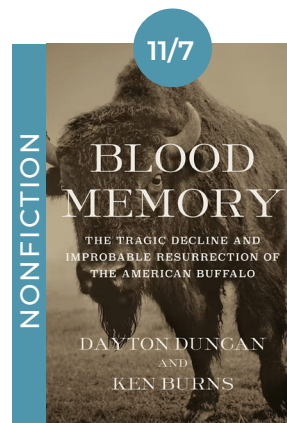
Mother, Nature

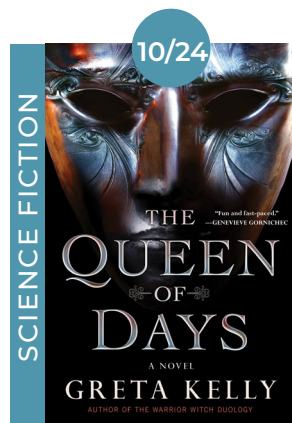
Let Us Descend

The epic story of the buffalo in America, from prehistoric times to today—a moving and beautifully illustrated work of natural history.



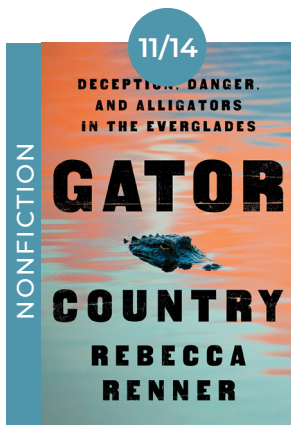
The Queen of Days

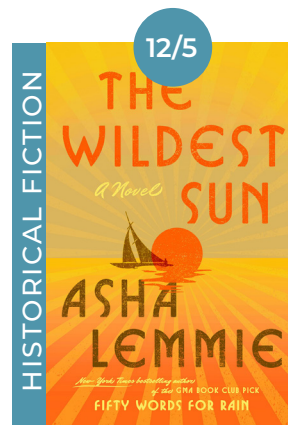
The Happy Couple

Celine and Luke's wedding is fast approaching, and everything is great...on the surface. Come witness the ever increasingly complicated lives of this "happy couple."



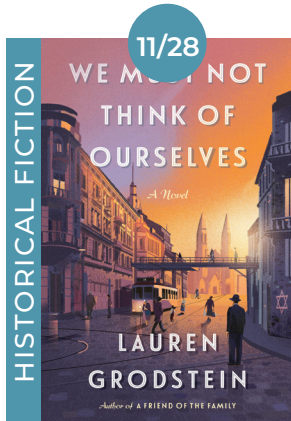
Gator Country

Follow Officer Jeff Babauta as he goes undercover into the mysterious world of alligator poaching and its larger-than-life Floridian characters.



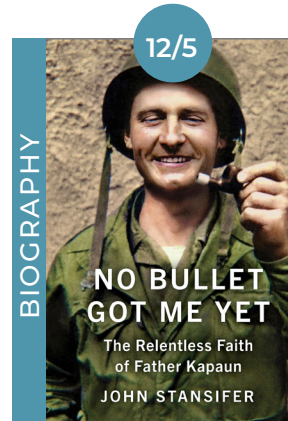
The Wildest Sun

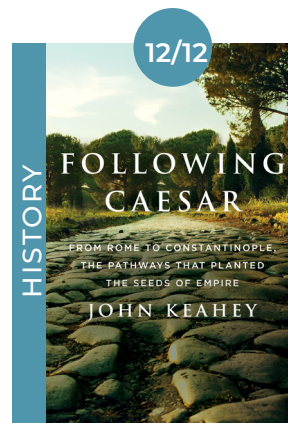

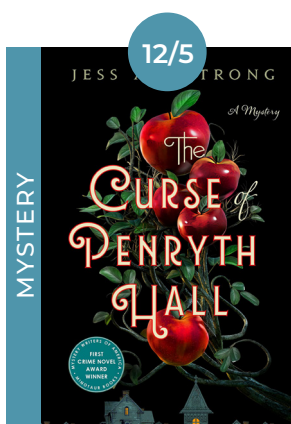
