June 1st marked the start of the annual Summer Reading and Learning program at the Library. 3,000 kids and teens participated in this year's Adventure @ Your Library – there really is no place like the Library in the summertime.

1,200 kids, teens, and families streamed into the backyard at the North East Branch Library for the annual Children's Book Festival. Meeting authors and illustrators, eating ice cream, and jumping through giant bubbles were just a few of the activities on this fun-filled day.

Those looking for the perfect way to spend a sunny day found their way to one of our **Story Trails.** Located at Brantwood, Calvert, Conowingo, and Perryville parks, Story Trails combine a walk in the great outdoors with a fun story to enjoy along the way.
